Sunday, June 7, 2020 Trinity Sunday



“The Princess said, ‘I pulled him out of the water, and so I name him Moses.’”

While labeled Sunday School, please feel free to use these ideas in a way that blesses your family. You do not have to do all the activities nor do you need to do them on Sunday morning. You can use whatever translation of the Bible or Children’s Bible you have in your home.

Read: Exodus 1: 8-2:10

Activities and Background:

God sent 5 women to watch over Moses so he could grow to manhood and to faith in God. Each woman played a particular role and was faithful, obedient and clever. It is a story on the importance of the nurture of God’s littlest ones into adulthood. Parents, Sunday School teachers, friends, older siblings and community folks all play a role in protecting children.

1. Here is a time for young children to get out a basket and a baby doll. Encourage the child to use the props as an adult tells the story.
 - I wonder how Moses’s mother got this idea.
 - I wonder if Baby Moses was scared or if he cried while in the basket.
 - I wonder why the princess bathes in the Nile River and not in a tub like we do.
 - I wonder if the princess saw or heard the baby first.
2. Young children can count to 5. List the 5 women. Count them. Describe what each did.
 - I wonder how each watched over Moses.
 - I wonder who the people are which God has given to watch over you.
3. Take a walk as a family along the river.
 - I wonder what things you see.
 - I wonder what sounds you hear.
4. Older children might want to look up some information about Egyptian culture, find the Nile on a map or try making a basket which is watertight.
5. As a family decide what you might be able to do to help protect God’s littlest ones: foster parent, adopt, Big Brother Big Sister, walk in March of Dimes campaign, donate to food bank.
6. Read the story again from a different Bible. Draw a picture to remind you of the story.
7. Say a prayer together thanking God for those who care for us and praying for children who might be alone and scared.
